Arengada is fenemino of the verb participle harangue. Harangue is a motivating speech to people who are going to carry out a mission (especially those who March to war). Then arengada is the person who has received or heard one of his and, at least in theory, is motivated, animated.

Cezanne is incorrectly written, and should be written as "Cézanne" being its meaning:
Cezanne is the surname of a famous French Impressionist painter, (Paul Cézanne 1839-1906)

fachento

In Costa Rica FACHENTO meaning cheerful, happy, satisfied, but also means that denotes it, especially by the expression of his face and his attitude. I think that at least in my country (Costa Rica) the word FACHENTO is derived from FACIA (41 Italian face;. There is also the term FACHENTERA, which is joy, happiness, and until such time occasionally, arrogance. Directly related to these terms, there is the word FACHA, meaning appearance, appearance and mood. I am not sure that these words are used exclusively in Costa Rica.
